

G: We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

In contrast to the Apostles' Creed, the Nicene Creed emphasizes the full divinity of Christ in response to the emerging heresy that Christ, like all of us, had a beginning ("there was a time when he was not"). If Christ did not somehow share in the divinity of the Father, the thinking went, then how could he give to us what he does not have — immortality? The Creed, in turn, reflects the Pauline teaching that the love of God burns so brightly in Christ that even death cannot separate us from it (Romans 8:38-39).

By intinction:


In the pew:

partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat. You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available just inside as you enter the sanctuary.

Need Gluten-free bread or grape juice? These options are available on this individual elements table.

During distribution, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. Dispose of the container in the narthex after worship.






About Today's Music

Last Sunday we returned to music for the liturgy that hasn't been sung at QALC in several years: the Sanctus ("Holy, holy, holy Lord...") and Agnus Dei ("Lamb of God...") from the Deutsche Messe (German Mass) of Austrian composer Franz Schubert (1797-1828). Today at the 10:30 service we add the Kyrie ("Lord, have mercy..."), which may be new to QALC. I have had in the back of my mind to re-introduce the Sanctus and Agnus Dei, and Pastor John inquired about adding the Schubert while he is serving at QALC, so it's a perfect opportunity! In 1827 Schubert was commissioned by his friend, a poet, librarian and physicist named Johann Philipp Neumann, to write the Deutsche Messe. It's not a Mass in the strictest sense, but rather a collection of hymn paraphrases based on the liturgy. Church musician Richard Proulx (1937–2010), who served at St. Thomas Episcopal Church in Medina from 1970 to 1980, adapted Schubert's pieces into English, and they are included in Evangelical Lutheran Worship as well as the Episcopal Hymnal 1982, among other. - Cantor Kyle
