A Place of Grace

Do you ever wonder why people act out in hostility? Psychologists have their reasons, but one always stands out to me: people respond with hostility when they feel a lack of acceptance.

Six years ago, we celebrated our 100th anniversary as a congregation. Pastor Wayne Bacus, my predecessor, spoke at the event. He called Queen Anne Lutheran Church "a place of grace," and he gave a powerful example to illustrate his point. At a time when other churches ostracized members who had undergone divorce, he said, our congregation welcomed them. It set us apart in a positive and meaningful way.

I am proud to be the pastor of a church with a heritage of welcoming others regardless of something like their marital status. I love our mission to proclaim God's love in Christ to *every person*, no exceptions. If you are reading this and find yourself at a place in life where you feel judged or excluded, I want you to know that you have a place here. You belong here.

One of my favorite stories about acceptance comes from Paul. In Galatians, he talks about his experience of how, despite having what he calls a "physical infirmity" related to a visual impairment, the Galatians "did not scorn or despise me, but welcomed me as an angel of God, as Christ Jesus" (4:14). They, too, had been a place of grace.

As we begin a new year, I invite you to join me in leaning *even more* into our identity as a place of grace. If you feel tempted, as I sometimes do, to judge or criticize another person, take a moment to remind yourself that you do not know what struggles in life he or she may be experiencing. Then remind yourself that, like you and me, they are a child of God through adoption in the spirit of Christ Jesus our Lord (Gal 4:5).

Leaning into our identity as a place of grace might not change the world, but it could brighten a small corner of it by transforming hate and hostility into love and gratitude through the medium of acceptance.

Sunday, January 26—Save The Date

We will be holding our Annual Congregational Meeting on Sunday, January 26. It will be held in-person after our 10:30 worship.

The purpose of the annual meeting of the congregation is

- to review and celebrate the previous year's accomplishments;
- to elect officers and delegates for the coming year;
- to consider and vote on constitutional amendments to change the quorum requirement from a minimum of 35 voting members to one-third of voting members and to authorize electronic meeting participation; and to hear and vote on next year's guidelines for expenditures and any other proposals requiring the majority approval of the membership.

Look for further announcements in bulletins and emails as to when copies of the constitutional motions, the 2024 financials and the 2025 proposed budget, and eventually the full Annual Report, will be made available, in print and online in the website Members Area.

A quorum of members is required to accomplish our tasks, and of course we hope you will be able to attend.

Housing Matters

In 1986, Louise Robertson gifted Queen Anne with a \$100,000 gift to use for purchasing a house in the church neighborhood. For the next 26 years, the house on McGraw provided semi-independent housing for low-income individuals who were severely or chronically mentally ill. In 2013, the house transitioned to become a residence for young people in the Lutheran Volunteer Corps doing volunteer work in church-related agencies serving the needlest residents of Seattle. In 2016, it became the parsonage home of Pastor Peterson.

A professional inspection early this year found mold in the parsonage basement to which Pastor is physically sensitive. Special efforts have been made in recent months to ensure his continued good health while living in the parsonage, including addressing cleaning and ventilation issues in the second-floor bathroom, replacing the very old and dusty carpet in the second-floor bedrooms with new laminate flooring, cleaning air ducts and hiring licensed professionals to remediate the mold issues in the basement.

Unfortunately, the post-remediation inspection of the parsonage basement on December 17th found the mold issue has not been adequately abated. This has caused Pastor and the Council great concern. In the interest of Pastor's health, the Council has authorized the addition of a Housing Allowance to Pastor's compensation, in roughly the amount spent annually for operating the parsonage and contributing to a maintenance reserve. This will allow Pastor to make his own alternate, housing arrangements and move out of the parsonage. Council will next turn to consideration and planning for future action regarding this gift of property that has served Queen Anne and our neighbors so well for so long.

Re: Plumbing Issues Dec 15

The first-floor men's urinal started spewing water Sunday, December 15 after late service. There were two issues, it turns out. When flushed, the water did not stop running; also, the urinal drain was somewhat plugged with long-term sedimentation, so that it could not allow large amounts of water to pass through. The excess water ran over the top of the bowl onto the floor. Tom McLauchlan found a screwdriver and shut off the water at the urinal. Others grabbed towels and mops, and helped mop up. (Useful information: The water turnoff for the entire building is next to the water heater in the basement janitor closet, if you see a leak that you cannot stop.)

Fans and dehumidifiers were subsequently used to dry the carpet and narthex floor over the next five days. The wood floor was damaged near the narthex kitchen—the flooring buckled at joints. Some water seeped down into basement restrooms. Thanks to all of you who helped in any way!! You are all honorary Property Committee members for future fire drills!

FEBRUARY 9, 2025: Living Out Inclusivity

Nathan Todd

In this presentation, Dr. Todd will discuss the process that some Christian faith communities engage in to become and then live out being open and inclusive to the LGBTQIA+ community. The presentation is based on Dr. Todd's research where he has interviewed over 70 people across the U.S. from different Protestant Christian faith traditions. He also will discuss historical context and the broader movement within Protestant Christianity to create LGBTQIA+ open and inclusive faith communities. Overall, Dr. Todd looks forward to sharing his work and engaging with questions and conversation.

Dr. Nathan Todd is a Professor of Psychology at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. In his research he focuses on religious spaces such as congregations to understand how they may provide places of belonging, connection, and avenues to engage in social justice. He also does research on LGBTQIA+ health equity and LGBTQIA+ religion and spirituality. Overall, he hopes that his work brings visibility and promotes constructive dialogue around issues of LGBTQIA+ inclusion in religious spaces and beyond.

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might... Isaiah 6:3

Do you hear a song, or maybe a multitude of songs, when you read the words above? We know these words in hymnody— in traditional songs, in praise songs, as part of the Eucharistic liturgy, and more. These words are deep in the bones of the Church. Of course, like so many lyrics that we sing in church, they weren't created out of thin air. We first hear these words from seraphs during the strange and grand vision that Isaiah had when he entered the holiest of holy places in the Temple— the place that housed the ark of God, the place revered as God's earthly throne, the place where God was simultaneously present in the heavenly realm

and within the fabric of the world. We hear these words in Isaiah's call story in Isaiah 6:1-8. (Go ahead ... read the Isaiah story now before reading the rest of this article.)

As Isaiah enters into the Holy of Holies, God grants Isaiah a glimpse into God's celestial throne room. God is so magnificent and big that the hem of God's robe fills the temple. God is attended by fierce and fiery creatures – scary flying snakes with six wings called seraphim. These were not the cute cherubs holding flutes and harps. These were sea serpent-sized creatures singing (shrieking, screaming) in loud, ear-piercing voices, "Holy, holy, holy, Lord God almighty..."

Isaiah is overcome. He falls on his knees and cries, "Woe is me!" Isaiah knows, in that moment, who the Creator of the universe is and what this Creator can do. Isaiah knows he could be destroyed in the flash of a second.

It needs to be said, of course, that Isaiah's vision didn't happen in a vacuum. Isaiah entered the holy of holies when the Assyrians were attacking and the people of Jerusalem were trying to barricade themselves against this most formidable army. Outside of the Temple it was a dark and scary time. For Isaiah, and the rest of the Judeans, the world felt frightening and terrifying and out-of-control.

Do you know this feeling? This feeling of being so small and powerless in a world that seems so big and overwhelming. This feeling of the world being topsy turvy and unpredictable. This feeling of not knowing what to do next because everything seems like too much to bear.

For Isaiah, the next thing that happens in his vision is that a huge seraph comes at him with a piece of burning coal and presses it to his lips. The pain must have been brutal. But when the coal touches Isaiah's lips, things are clarified for him— he is cleansed and he is prepared for what is coming next and he instantly pledges to God, "Here I am. Send me." And Isaiah becomes God's prophet. (If only things could be made this clear for all of us.)

In any case, what do we do with this strange and beautiful story? What does Isaiah's call story mean for us today? Pleaseknow that I cannot wrap this story up in a tidy bow – nor do I want to – because this isn't how life works. (Also, Isaiah couldn't either ... as much as Isaiah pledged to follow God, if you read Isaiah 6:9-11 you'll hear Isaiah crying out, "How long, O Lord?"). But this is where I seize hope.

Above all things, God is God, and we are not. God is wholly other. We cannot know the mind of God. And yet, in this extraordinary story, there are glimpses beyond majesty and awe. God is fearful to behold, and God holds us as a mother holds a child to her breast. The touch of God burns, and yet it is with life-giving fire. God towers above, and God embraces us in inexplicable and earth-shattering tenderness and forgiveness. The One who creates all things also lives in the dirt and muck of life.

Dear Beloveds, may you always know and trust through all things: God is God. Almighty and Always. The One who shepherds you in life also tenderly holds you into death and beyond. The One who created the universe is as close as your next breath. For God gave you life, named you, and holds you near. Forever. Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might.
