Holy Communion— All baptized people who seek a taste of the new and forgiven life in Jesus Christ are welcome to receive the sacrament. We confess and believe that Christ, who fills all things, comes to us in a special way through the Sacrament of Bread and Wine and that by sharing in this meal, we share in Christ’s real presence among us.

The ministrations of the Sacrament is given in two ways:

In the pew:

You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available in the narthex as you enter.

When invited to commune, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. Dispose of the waste in the narthex after worship.

By intinction:

When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands.

Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.

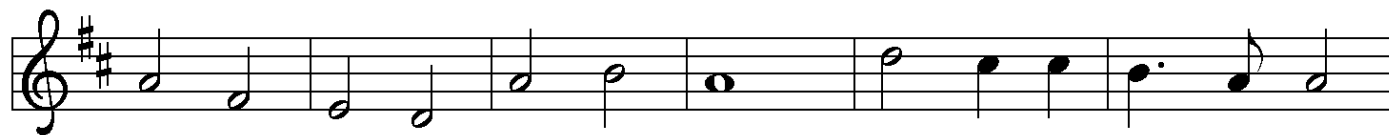

About Today's Music

Today's prelude, postlude, and hymnody bring together an eclectic collection of musical idioms. Here are some highlights: Before the service, we hear three very different settings of the African American spiritual melody most closely associated with "In Christ There Is No East or West" (ELW 650, sung during Communion at the 10:30 service). Each composer heard this morning brings a unique lens to the music: Joe Cox studied business, music, and theology, and has extensive experience as an arranger and recording session manager, especially for "Billboard" country music; Ronald Nelson was a prolific Lutheran composer, and today's liturgical music from ELW Setting Four (previously in LBW) was also composed by him; Michael Hassell served as a musician for several Christian denominations, composed extensively using elements of jazz, and was also active as a theatrical producer, director, and performer. Today's Hymn of the Day features newly published piano music by your cantor, included in a collection just released from Augsburg Fortress called *Let It Rip! at the Piano, Congregational Song Accompaniments: Volume 3*; my goal was to write a hymn introduction and accompaniment that are accessible to a wide range of pianists and bring out the gentle ebb and flow of the melody. After the service, we hear music from one of the North German Baroque masters, Franz Tunder, who preceded his son-in-law Dietrich Buxtehude (heard last Sunday) as organist at the Lutheran Church of St. Mary in Lübeck, Germany.

TODAY'S FORUM: Living Out Inclusivity

Come to the Conference Room from 9 to 10 AM! Dr. Nathan Todd will discuss the process that some Christian faith communities engage in to become and then live out being open and inclusive to the LGBTQIA+ community. The presentation is based on Dr. Todd's research, where he has interviewed over 70 people across the U.S. from different Protestant Christian faith traditions. He also will discuss historical context and the broader movement within Protestant Christianity to create LGBTQIA+ open and inclusive faith communities. Dr. Todd looks forward to sharing his work and engaging with questions and conversation.

Dr. Nathan Todd is a Professor of Psychology at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. In his research he focuses on religious spaces such as congregations to understand how they may provide places of belonging, connection, and avenues to engage in social justice. He also does research on LGBTQIA+ health equity and LGBTQIA+ religion and spirituality. Overall, he hopes that his work brings visibility and promotes constructive dialogue around issues of LGBTQIA+ inclusion in religious spaces and beyond.
