In the pew:


You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available in the narthex as you enter.

When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands.


Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.



About Today's Music

Today's Hymn of the Day features a text by 19^{th} century Anglican priest Frederick Faber (1814–1863). The 20^{th} century melody we sing with it today was reportedly written for this text (though originally was not published with any particular hymn). Named ST. HELENA for the monastic women's community known as the Order of St. Helena hosted at Calvary Episcopal Church in Manhattan, it was composed by American organist Calvin Hampton (1938–1984), who served that congregation. Hampton was known for immense talent as organist, composer, and planner of liturgies, and his "Fridays at Midnight" organ recitals at Calvary Church from 1974 to 1983 were very popular. His original hymn tunes were also sung at these recitals. —*Cantor Kyle*



Communion as a Resource to Resist Queer Religious Trauma

Prof. Mary Elise Lowe will introduce us to the ways that Christianity can harm and traumatize many LGBTQIA+ Christians. Then we'll explore how a Lutheran understanding of the Lord's Supper as a place of community where God is offered FOR YOU affirms queer persons and extends a welcome of mutuality and affirmation.

Mary Elise Lowe is Professor of Religion and Philosophy at Augsburg University in Minneapolis. Her work focuses on Martin Luther's theology, LGBTQIA+ theologies, and religion and trauma. One of her recent articles is "Communion for All: A Queer, Lutheran Sacrament of Wild Welcome. Prof. Lowe's forthcoming book is *ReEngaging ELCA Social Teaching on Faith, Sexism, and Justice.* The book is co-authored with Mary J. Streufert and will be available in May of 2025. Prof. Lowe and Dr. Streufert will be teaching from their new book at Holden Village in August of 2025 (08/15 to 08/22).

ATONEMENT—PT. I (A four-part Forum series)

MARCH 2 and 9: Atonement in the Hebrew Bible/ Rabbinic Judaism

with Dr. Beatrice Lawrence

The word "atonement" is a tricky one in the Hebrew Bible and subsequent Judaism. Even the Hebrew words used to describe this idea are unclear. However, it IS clear that there are concepts within the Bible and Judaism involving sin and reconciliation with other people and with God. What requires such reconciliation? Is it always possible? What are the mechanisms for addressing this? What is the nature of sin, and why does it happen? In this forum, we will use biblical and other Jewish texts to address these questions.

Beatrice Lawrence is Associate Professor of Hebrew Bible at Seattle University, where she also teaches courses in Jewish Studies. Though her research interests are diverse (many centered on the history of Jewish biblical interpretation), she is currently working on projects surrounding mental illness and the Hebrew Bible. She lives in Seattle with her two daughters and rescue pup.
