The Apostles' Creed emphasizes the full humanity of Christ (e.g., he was born, suffered, and died) in response to one of the earliest heresies, namely, the view that Christ only "appeared" to be human. Why? Detractors believed that the Spirit of God, which is good, could not dwell in a material or physical body, which is evil. When we profess the Apostles' Creed, following Jewish tradition, we insist otherwise. The world God made is good! With great joy and without contradiction, therefore, we can say with John 1:14 that "the Word became flesh and dwelled among us."

You may commune in the pews with individual elements. These are available in the narthex as you enter.


When invited to commune, peel off the bottom tab to eat the bread; peel off the top tab to drink the wine. Dispose of the waste in the narthex after worship.

When prompted by the ushers, come down the center aisle to kneel at the railing; please sanitize your hands.


Receive a wafer in your hands. Dip it in a chalice, either wine or grape juice, before partaking. Use the outside aisle to return to your seat.



# **About Today's Music**

Liturgical worship includes the *propers* (the scripture, prayers, and other texts that are unique to the day or festival) and the *ordinary* (the items that stay the same). As we turn to the preparatory season of Lent before our celebration of Easter, we again sing the liturgy (the *ordinary* texts) to music from Setting Nine in ELW, plus the familiar music at the Gospel Acclamation for "Return to the Lord" that dates to *Lutheran Book of Worship*. Like the jubilant word, "Alleluia," the bolder, celebratory sounds and stops from the organ will return at Easter, along with the victorious hymn of praise that begins, "This is the feast of victory for our God." Today's organ prelude and postlude function almost like *propers*, as this year, like many first Sundays in Lent, we again hear J. S. Bach's sublime setting of the 16<sup>th</sup>century German hymn, "O Mortal, Bewail Your Manifold Sins" (musically portraying the image of the Savior "stretched out upon the cross" at the end of the piece) as well as Bach's "Little" organ fugue in G minor. — *Cantor Kyle*

# MARCH 2 and 9: Atonement in the Hebrew Bible/ Rabbinic Judaism

#### with Dr. Beatrice Lawrence

The word "atonement" is a tricky one in the Hebrew Bible and subsequent Judaism. Even the Hebrew words used to describe this idea are unclear. However, it IS clear that there are concepts within the Bible and Judaism involving sin and reconciliation with other people and with God. What requires such reconciliation? Is it always possible? What are the mechanisms for addressing this? What is the nature of sin, and why does it happen? In this forum, we will use biblical and other Jewish texts to address these questions.

**Beatrice Lawrence** is Associate Professor of Hebrew Bible at Seattle University, where she also teaches courses in Jewish Studies. Though her research interests are diverse (many centered on the history of Jewish biblical interpretation), she is currently working on projects surrounding mental illness and the Hebrew Bible. She lives in Seattle with her two daughters and rescue pup.

# **ATONEMENT—PT. II**

## MARCH 23 and 30: Atonement in the New Testament

## with Dr. Lynn Hofstad

While many of the theological models of atonement were developed long after the writing of the New Testament, New Testament authors applied the idea of atonement to Jesus' death as a means to make sense of why Jesus died and what that could mean theologically. These forums will look at how New Testament authors, Paul in particular, understood the death of Jesus and how that connected to the Jewish understanding of atonement.

**Dr. Lynn Hofstad** holds a Ph.D. in Systematic and Philosophical Theology from the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley, CA. She is the Program Coordinator at Queen Anne Lutheran Church, and her scholarly interests focus on feminist theology, ecotheology, the doctrine of the atonement, and Lutheran theology.

When everyone else in Lazarus' life had given up hope, Jesus called his friend back to life. But that was not the end of the story. Jesus called the community to remove the stone that blocked Lazarus from life and then told them to get even closer in order to take off the graveclothes covering his face and restricting his body. People leaving prison face this reality every day. By connecting people exiting incarceration to churches and building communities of care, we begin to practice this resurrection in our lives, our churches, and our world.

**Rev. Dexter Kearny** is a pastor who has been organizing people of faith into the interconnected work of justice through prison ministry, climate justice, and housing advocacy. He believes we are called to a radical imagination where the systems of death in our world are composted into plantings of life. In his free time, you can find him cuddling with his cats (Tennessee & Jersey), reading a book, or baking a tasty treat all with his amazing clergy spouse, Liz.


Joel sings weekly with The Compline Choir, and on March 16, Cantor Kyle joins for an informal post-Compline recital.


